SPH4U: Tension and Pulleys

A: Physics Pulleys

You will need two pulleys, some string, 500 g masses and a spring scales Set up your equipment as shown in the diagram.

1. Observe. Change the angle of the string that passes over the pulley. Describe what you observe.

No matter the angle of the string that passes over the pulley, the forces do not change.




Reason. Devise a rule describing how a pulley affects the magnitude and direction of the force of tension in a string.

Physics Pulleys: Pulleys can affect the direction, but not the magnitude of the force of tension in a string.

B: Testing String Theory

 Predict.Don't set this up yet! Consider the two pulley situation shown in the next diagram which uses two 500 g masses. Suppose we measure the tension in the string at the three positions indicated. Predict the values of those three tension measurements. Provide a rationale for each.

Prediction		Rationale
(1) 4,910		Ft, must equal Fg since they must balance. :, we found Fg
(2) OH		The force of tension are acting in opposite directions, so they cancel out.
(3) 4.9N	9 9	Ft3 must equal Fg since they must balace, so we found Fg



2. Reason. What is the readability of your spring scale? Estimate the uncertainty in the results you will get.

The readability of our spring scale is 0.1 N. The uncertainty is ±0.05 N

3. **Test and Evaluate.** Set up the materials as shown (just hold the pulleys in the air). Record your results along with uncertainties. Do you results agree with your predictions? Offer an explanation for the results you found.

4. **Reason.** Create a definition of how tension works that explain what it means when we say, "there is 4.9 N of tension in a string".



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C: The Atwood Machine

An Atwood machine consists of two masses tied together and suspended over a pulley. For this part of the investigation, you will use the equipment set up at the front of the class.

1. Predict. The two masses are identical. You give agentle push to one mass. Predict the motion of the massafter it leaves contact with your hand. Justify your prediction.

The motion of the masses will be constant velocity because there are no additional forces exerted and also the mass will move in the direction you push

2. Test. Try it out.Describe your observations.Do they agree with your prediction?

Our observations agree with our prediction. The mass we pushed on moved with a constant velocity in the direction we pushed in.

3. Predict. The mass of A is now less than B. Predict the motion of mass A after you release it. How will the motion of the two objects compare? Justify your prediction.

Mass A will accelerate upwards after we release it. Hass B will move downwards with the same acceleration as A.
